The New Mekong: Changes and Expectations

Hanoi. October 29, 2015

The intactness of the lower Mekong River finished since the Xayaburi dam started in 2012. In the past few years, the Lower Mekong region has been in turmoil with voices and concerns over large hydropower dams on the mainstream and tributary of the Mekong river. Following Xayaburi, Don Sahong, Pak Beng, and other coming dams are game changers not only in terms of ecological conditions but also social, economic, geopolitical and development cooperation contexts in this part of the world. We're witnessing a new Mekong after decades of silence of the untamed river.
